DJ Clear



1: How did you get started DJing?

I got started with my cousin Damaso, DJ Shamrock, who had one of the biggest sound systems in Brooklyn. I expressed interest in DJing, and he helped me out. He gave me my first pair of 1200's, let me spin at block parties, local clubs and stuff like that. I haven't looked back since.

2: How do you approach your job differently from other DJs out there?

I've got an unorthodox style, and I'm versatile. When I first got in the game, I was only into hiphop. Thankfully, I learned to mix other genres of music, which is extremely important if you want to play internationally and expand your fan base. I can play to any crowd on the planet.

3: Vinyl or CDs?

I was asked that question a few years ago during a TV interview. Back then, I was a strong advocate of vinyl, but now, it's neither! We're in a digital age and since early last year. I've been sponsored by Scratch Live, which lets you play MP3s like records. As much as I love vinyl, you can't go against technology and expect to win. Plus, it's easier to lug around my 250gig hard drive than my record boxes!

4: What genre do you prefer working with?

Well, like I said, I can play all genres, but I prefer hip-hop 'cause that's my roots. I love that different areas like Houston are blowing up right now, that helps keeps things fresh. In the clubs though, reggaetón is definitely the most fun to

5: A crazy club experience you would like to share?

Just one! (Laughs.) Man, there are so many. Ok, I was DJing the late, great Big Pun's first album release party at this club called Diablo, which is now Show in New York City. There were two Lamborghini Diablos right on the dance floor! You know us Latinos, we like to do it real big. It didn't take long before the place was packed! We shut the street down early! When I left, it was crazy outside!! Fire trucks, police cruisers and the block closed off! There were a few hundred people outside that couldn't get in! It was incredible. Big shouts to Terror Squad -- they definitely know how to do it up!!! Big Pun forever!!!

6: Favorite club?

Just one! (Laughs again.) Nah, that's easy -- The Tunnel [in New York]. There are lots of clubs that have really dope DJ booths and in comparison, The Tunnel wasn't as great, but with all the history there, it always felt special to step into the booth, and the crowd was always rocking.







dj**clear** words/**daniel**rodriguez



Asked to describe himself, Leo Canela, known professionally as DJ Clear, tells me what I already know; "I'm low key and laid back. I'm not very flashy, which kind of contradicts what I do but I like to be recognized for my work."

Tall, dark and Dominican, Clear has been a DJ since the mid-8os. He's a mere 31 but his career has made leaps and bounds from his humble beginnings of making mixed tapes and spinning at house parties. He has been featured at well-known clubs like Tunnel, Cheetah Club and the Copacabana. He's also had the chance to spin on location for movies such as Above the Rim, and I Like it Like That.

Most recently, he produced tracks for MTV's *TRL* and Galavision's *Galascene*. You can even see him in action on the dance TV show *Club La Bomba* on the Metro Channel with Colombian bombshell Sofia Vergara.

A Brooklyn boy, Clear found his professional name while tagging as a kid. He assured me that although it stuck, his alias has "no real relevance." Clear was lucky enough to rise through the ranks under Shamrock, one of Brooklyn's biggest DJs when Run DMC was hot and everyone rocked Adidas. Shamrock took the 15-year-old aspiring mixer under his wing, letting him carry records and watch him work.

Clear first saw the power DJs have over a crowd when he tagged along to a party. That was it. The bug bit him in a major way. "You expose people to new music. You educate them." He assured me that the high he gets from being so respected is as addictive as any drug.

Although hip hop is his forte, he mixes it up with Latin music and listens to jazz legends Bob James and Grover Washington when he isn't working.

As for his future endeavors, Clear is most interested in producing. "Everybody has to bring their own style. I grew up [with] hip hop. That's what I am. I'm Latin, so I have that as part of my heritage. You want to be

able to bring out a different fusion. Maybe I'll bring out something a little more Latin oriented, maybe have more edge to it, but it will be my own. A lot of producers out there have their own style and that's how we keep it going."

Shamrock, Clear's mentor and older cousin, had nothing but praise for his work. Before moving to Miami to pursue the nightclub scene back in '89, Shamrock gave Clear a pair of Technic 1200 turntables, already broken in. Clear's reaction was total disbelief. Shamrock chuckled, remembering how baffled Clear was at the gift. "He deserved them. He really had a lot of talent ... He really, really enjoys it. He's one of those quiet rising stars that you don't know about until they just blow up."

Not satisfied with just playing records, Clear formed a production company, Panacy Productions, named in honor of his cousin who died of leukemia. "My only regret is not having him around to share in the success." Recently, Panacy partnered with Enye Incorporated, a new media company of young professionals who have wanted to work with Clear for several years. Their first chance came when they produced a new song for *Galascene*. "Once they got the go ahead for the show, there was no question I was going to be doing the tracks."

Perhaps his dream of being the next Jellybean Benitez (DJ turned record label executive turned music mogul) will be realized. Besides, if things go accordingly, the high point of his career, "hasn't come yet."
